George '65 and Seretha '67 Tinsley . . .

Mr. George Tinsley, Sr. is a master of the triple threat position in life, basketball and business. He is CEO of PenGeo, Inc., Tinsley Group, Inc. and Tinsley Family Concessions, collectively Tampa Bay's 3rd largest Black-owned enterprise, and one of the fastest growing independent restaurant conglomerates in the nation. He credits his roots on the basketball courts of the impoverished Smoketown neighborhood in Kentucky for teaching him life's most valuable lesson: always be prepared to shoot, pass or dribble the ball.

George was introduced to competitive athletics at Louisville Male High School, Louisville, Kentucky where he excelled in both basketball and track. He graduated from Male in 1965.

Abandoned as a baby and reared in poverty by an elderly babysitter, Tinsley's talent was as undeniable as his stardom. He was recruited on scholarship to Kentucky Wesleyan College in 1966, and as a freshman led the team to the first of 3 Division II NCAA National Championships. He quickly earned the rep of being a 'defensive demon'. and would take the Panthers on to 2 national titles in 1968 and 1969, for which he was twice named All-American, selected as an alternate to the 1968 U.S. Olympic Team, and would soon be drafted to the old American Basketball League to play for the Oaks, Washington Capitals, Miami Floridians, Kentucky Colonels and the New York Nets.

In triple threat tradition, Tinsley was already prepared to pursue other options when his 3-year tour with the ABA ended in 1972. He had graduated from Kentucky Wesleyan on the dean's list and was the first African-American to receive the prestigious Oak and Ivy Award for academic achievement. Tinsley transitioned his talent for team management to the corporate sector, beginning with an 8-year management career at Kentucky Fried Chicken Corporation where he paved the way to his first franchise in 1984.

Within 5 years he had acquired and built 5 more franchises and in 1989 was named KFCC's Premier Operator, the highest honor presented to franchisees. Mr. Tinsley's holdings now span 45 restaurants, including KFCC, TGI Fridays, 6 Starbucks, 6 Pizza Huts, Jose Cuervos, Quiznos and Home Team Sports Bar and Grill. Though he doesn't publicize his annual earnings, Mr. Tinsley confirms to the Power Broker that his franchises all perform at or above the national average (KFC reported average store sales of \$890,000 in 2004).

After 21 years of entrepreneurship, Tinsley holds as many records in business as he did in basketball. He was honored as KFCC's Premier Operator for a second time in 1994. His TGI Friday in Tampa has won

the Highest Domestic Franchise Sales award 3 times since 1999, and the Domestic Franchise of the Year award 3 years straight from 1999 to 2002. Tinsley was named Florida's 1999

Minority Entrepreneur of the Year, was inducted to the Kentucky Wesleyan Alumni Hall of Fame in 2005, and is ranked #3 on the Power Broker Magazine's 1st Annual list of Tampa Bay's Biggest Blackowned companies.

Seretha Tinsley and her husband/business partner, George embody their motto ... Corporate Excellence and Community Service. Seretha has been a trailblazer and overachiever her entire life. She became the first African American female to attend and graduate from Ky. Wesleyan College in 1971. In the mid eighties, Seretha became the one of the first black female General Managers in radio. Seretha was not only a "first" in many ways, she was a top achiever, having been awarded. Ky Wesleyan's top student honor, the Oak and Ivy. Additionally, she was recognized as America's top Radio Station General Manager. As an entrepreneur, civic leader, mother and wife, Seretha's commitment to excellence has always been her calling card.

LMHS Principal's Column

Note: This article is reprinted, with permission, from Louisville Magazine, November 08 issue.

Q: How can high schools most effectively reverse the drop in the statue of American education?

A: "The one thing that I think needs to occur more than anything else is: Our students have to be independent thinkers and they have to be self-taught. We can't possibly give them everything that they need because of the jobs that haven't been invented yet. So they have to be able to be problem-solvers first, and communicators as well. They need to be the ones who go well beyond where we are now and what we can even think of. And that's a whole mindset shift, because prior to this, education had its roots in developing students to fit a box. We taught them what we knew. We taught the way we were taught. And we can't do that anymore."



Q: Give us an example of how this is being done at Male.

A: "Through the help of GE and our board of education, we have identified those concepts that are core to science and to math, and we have tried to define them and get them down to three to give concepts that are critical and that our competitor (nations) all have a handle on.

"I think that in the average eight-grade year, 35 concepts in math are worked on and taught. And our counterparts in Pacific Rim countries are working on three to five concepts a year. But they go so deep that they never, ever touch them again. Fractions, for example, are something that is taught here in the third grade, fourth grade, fifth grade....I visited a Japanese school in Greenwich, Conn., a couple of years ago in which second-graders were taught some trigonometry, and it was never taught again. It was taught so deep and it was so meaningful that they never had to teach it again. They just keep exercising the concepts. So there you are. We are trying now to emulate all those people who actually were emulating us for so long."

Q: What is the first course you would add, if you could, to Male' curriculum?

A: "Character education. To me, character education is doing the right thing when no one is watching. This country needs to get back in grips with that."

Q: How would you characterize the current generation of high school students?

A: "I see them as very concerned whether there's going to be an America for them. We are seeing students staying at home longer than ever before with their parents. We're seeing people who aren't comfortable with being too far away from mom and dad, and that they may not have the ability to purchase a home or have that two-car existence or that vacation every year.

"There's a lot of concern that the pinnacle of success happened in our generation - that from this point on. With the global uncertainty, with everything compromised, they're not sure what foot to step forward next. They're the uncertain generation, if you will. They're not certain where to go or what to do next."

O: What can schools do for these young people?

A: "Give them the ability to become independent, as I said before - the ability to be self-taught, well-rounded and well-versed in the present and the past. To be a critical thinker and a problem-solver, and to be able to create their own opportunities and exhibit character. And let the character take you forward."



Born and raised in Louisville, KY, Seretha Summers graduated from Louisville Male High School in 1967 and went on to matriculate at Kentucky Wesleyan with a degree in Education in 1971.

Desiring to become a Missionary, Seretha took a 2 month trip to West Africa, visiting 6 countries and studying with educators from across the country. While in Africa, she developed such a respect for the way Africans were so informed about Americans and other Countries, she realized she could be more effective by becoming an educator in the US where she could have a greater impact on empowering young lives with knowledge.

Following her trip to Africa, Seretha embarked on what became a stellar career as an Elementary Teacher in the Jefferson County School System. While teaching, Seretha took an internship with her father, William E. Summers, III at WLOU Radio Station in Louisville. Working each afternoon, and on school holidays, she was introduced to the Broadcasting business by doing Community Ascertainments for licensing. Her father mentored her by having her start from the bottom and working her way up. Having worked the non-paying internship for 2 years, Seretha, counseled by her Mother, Eleanor Hutchinson, and 'other father' Jerome Hutchinson, she made the career move that would change her life. She retired after 3 years of teaching 5th grade and went to work full time at WLOU Radio Station. With role models such as her parents and the legendary Baltimore Broadcast Attorney Vince Pepper, she realized that business and radio was in her blood.

During her first 5 year tenure at WLOU, Seretha served as Program Director, Talk Show Hostess, and Operations Manager. When her husband, George, was relocated to Atlanta, GA, Seretha contacted Ragan Henry, owner of WAOK Radio and secured an entry level position with his Company. Within 6 months, Seretha was appointed Station Manager of WAOK and was instrumental in developing many initiatives, one of which was the 1st Annual WAOK Summer Gospel Songfest which was a catalyst for bringing business, church and community together.


After 3 short years, George, was relocated back to Louisville. Once back in Louisville, she returned to WLOU, this time, as Station/Sales Manager. Having worked in Atlanta, a major market, Seretha was able to take WLOU to large market status thanks to her Programming and National Sales experience.

While working at WLOU, Ragan Henry, her previous employer at WAOK in Atlanta, called Seretha to offer her the position of VP/General Manager of WPDQ in Jacksonville, FL. Seretha accepted the opportunity. This time, George and 2 children, relocated with her to Jacksonville. While in Jacksonville, Seretha left her mark and received the 'Radio Manager of the Year' Award at the Jack the Rapper Annual Convention.

In 1983 George approached Seretha about going into business for themselves. Together, they stepped out on faith, quitting their jobs, to become KFC Franchisees. Being a consummate professional, Seretha, set out to learn every aspect of the business before entering into the venture. She went to "Chicken University" at the KFC Corporate Offices in Louisville, KY. After completing Chicken U, Seretha then worked in other Franchise Restaurants to get hands on experience.

That 1983 'Leap of Faith' landed Seretha and family in Winter Haven, FL with their 1st KFC restaurant being built in Auburndale, FL. The company was named PenGeo, Inc. after their children, Penni and

George. Twentyfive years later, Seretha and George have amassed restaurants and concessions generating over \$40 million in annual revenue. In 2007, she proudly relinquished her title of Vice President of all companies to her son George II but remains active in



each company as CFO. Seretha manages a staff that oversees all Administrative and Fiduciary responsibilities.

Seretha's community service and progressive leadership has earned her numerous honors, recognitions and media coverage. She maintains her passion for teaching by incorporating it into every walk of her life. She is not just a phenomenal business woman; she takes pride in assisting others in reaching their "phenomenal potential".

Seretha is active with several minority affairs groups and has served and works with business, civic, educational and religious organizations for which she has been recognized and honored for her accomplishments and service to the community.

The 2009 track and field team looks to continue their recent success having won back to back state championships in the 2007 and 2008 seasons. This year's team returns many of last years stars including the defending state champion in the 100, 400 and 200 with football standout Justin Green. Other top returning stars are sprinters Chisom Omenyinma (200M and 4x200), Steve Mize (4x800 and 1600), Robbie Graham (100M, 4x100, 4x200 and 4x400), Tony Branch (High Jump and Long Jump), Kyle Jenkins (Shot Put and Discus) Stewart Brown (Hurdles), Kieren Story (4x100, 4x200, 4x400 and Hurdles) and Donnell Whitlock (4x200 and 4x100). Last years team set two more school records as the 4x100 and 4x200 relay teams established new standards for the states all time winning program. PAYING THE PRICE

After a heart-breaking loss in the first round of districts to St. X last year, Male's baseball team is seeking redemption. This was the earliest post season exit in about 15 years.

Head Coach Todd Driskell and his players are taking it up a notch this year and have just one goal in mind.

"This year's goal for the varsity team is to first come together as a team. If we accomplish this first goal, we feel like we have the talent and leadership to put us in a position to compete for the state championship," stated senior pitcher Scott Morrison.

Male's baseball team is no stranger to success. Some recent accomplishments include being regional runner ups in '00, '01, '02, and '06. Also, the team was regional champs and state runner ups in '03. Consistency has become a trademark of the bulldogs, who have been ranked in the top 10 for the last 10 years in a row.

These accomplishments have come through consistent rigorous practice sessions. For conditioning, the team is participating in workouts Mon, Wed & Thurs from 2:30 to 4 pm. In fact, the baseball team notoriously has a reputation as the hardest working sports team at Male.

"Our team definitely puts in the time and effort needed to become champions. We know what it takes and will stop at nothing to attain our goals and aspirations," said first baseman Andy Emery. "Every time we practice we make sure we bring it."

The results of these long practices are already apparent. Male's preseason schedule has been very successful with a 26-11 record. That impressive record came with a twist. Male's team used wooden bats while their opponents continued using metal bats.

"Wooden bats are much harder to hit with," said Coach Driskell. "The sweet spot on a wooden bat is about two inches in width and the sweet spot on a metal bat is about a foot in width." The sweet spot on the bat is the part that makes the ball jump off the bat. Deciding to go with wooden bats will make hitting with metal bats much easier in the future.

Male High's baseball team's prospects for this year are definitely promising. It should be an exciting season and one that the players and students at Male will remember for a long time to come.

Note: The season opens on March 14th at Mercer County (Scrimmage) at 11 a.m. Come out and support the Bulldogs.


MODERN EDUCATION

This article is reprinted from "The Spectator" April 1951.

In our schools today, many teachers insist that all modern means should be used in conveying knowledge to the student. Therefore many schools employ the use of moving pictures with the idea that since it is something strange and novel it must be good. These people, however, who probably have the best intentions, forget the basic purpose of education: to teach the student to think, so that he will be able to apply his brain to the toughest problems. If we go back a few years, we can readily see that all a classroom needed was a teacher who had the proper qualifications, and a student who was eager to learn. There were no "gimmicks" applied to try to find a way of putting less strain on the pupil's mind.

Today we find many schools whose leaders brag of the fact that their classes are taught in such a way that the slowest one in the class can keep up. This is tragic, for it slows down and keeps back those few students who are above average and would otherwise attain higher goals. Therefore the American people must realize that, while our forefathers were a little behind in their crude schoolhouses, the principle of education was there. Instead of the answers being flashed up on a screen, the students were made to dig out the answers for themselves
